## **III. DISCUSSION OF LEGISLATION**

### House Bill No. 31 by Representative Romero

This is a continuation of the discussion on House Bill No. 31 from a meeting held on May 2, 2023. Please check for the prior action to complete the record of discussion and motions on House Bill No. 31.

Representative Romero presented House Bill No. 31, which adds certain crimes against juveniles that require sex offender registration.

On behalf of the author, Representative Marino offered an amendment to remove second degree battery. Representative Marino offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendment. Without objection, the amendment was adopted by a vote of 9 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Horton, Knox, LaFleur, Seabaugh, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

Representative LaFleur offered a motion to report House Bill No. 31 by substitute. Without objection, House Bill No. 31 was reported by substitute by a vote of 9 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, Seabaugh, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

## Senate Bill No. 73 by Senator Robert Mills

Senator Robert Mills presented Senate Bill No. 73, which provides relative to truancy and assessment and service centers.

Representative Villio offered a motion to report Senate Bill No. 73 favorably. Without objection, Senate Bill No. 73 was reported favorably by a vote of 10 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, Muscarello, Seabaugh, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

### Senate Bill No. 117 by Senator Harris

At the request of the author, Representative Marino offered a motion to voluntarily defer action on Senate Bill No. 117, which provides relative to the crime of assault by drive-by shooting. Without objection, action on Senate Bill No. 117 was voluntarily deferred by a vote of 10 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, Muscarello, Seabaugh, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

### Senate Bill No. 31 by Senator Mizell

Senator Mizell presented Senate Bill No. 31, which creates database to track trafficking arrests, convictions, restitution, fines, and civil asset forfeiture.

Representative LaFleur offered a motion to report Senate Bill No. 31 favorably. Without objection, Senate Bill No. 31 was reported favorably by a vote of 9 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, Muscarello, and Seabaugh voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

## House Bill No. 286 by Representative Boyd

Representative Boyd presented House Bill No. 286, which provides relative to expungements for certain amounts of possession of marijuana.

On behalf of the author, Representative Marino offered amendments to:

- (1) Remove proposed law relative to misdemeanor first offenses of possession of marijuana over 14 grams;
- (2) Provide that proposed law only applies to misdemeanor first offenses of possession of marijuana of 14 grams or less, pursuant to present law (R.S. 40:966(C)(2)(a));
- (3) Remove proposed law relative to the exemption of processing fees for persons convicted of certain misdemeanor offenses for possession of marijuana;
- (4) Provide for a fee not to exceed \$300 for persons convicted of certain misdemeanor offenses for possession of marijuana;
- (5) Provide relative to the distribution of the \$300 fee to the La. Bureau of Criminal Identification and Information, the sheriffs, the district attorneys, and the clerks of court; and
- (6) Provide that the \$300 fee shall be null, void, and without effect on Aug. 1, 2026.

Representative Marino offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments. Without objection, the amendments were adopted by a vote of 9 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, Muscarello, and Seabaugh voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

Representative LaFleur offered a motion to report House Bill No. 286 with amendments. Without objection, House Bill No. 286 was reported with amendments by a vote of 7 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, and LaFleur voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

## House Bill No. 413 by Representative Ivey

Representative Ivey presented House Bill No. 413, which provides relative to parole eligibility for certain offenders.

Representative Marino offered a motion to report House Bill No. 413 favorably, to which Representative Villio objected. The administrative assistant called the roll, and the motion failed to pass by a vote of 5 yeas and 7 nays. Representatives Marino, Bryant, Knox, LaFleur, and Marcelle voted yea. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Horton, Muscarello, Seabaugh, and Villio voted nay.

### House Bill No. 498 by Representative Stefanski

Representative Stefanski presented House Bill No. 498, which provides relative to a mandatory minimum bail amount for certain offenses.

On behalf of the author, Representative Marino offered an amendment to reduce the proposed law mandatory minimum bail amounts to the following:

- (1) \$50,000 rather than \$100,000 for a crime of violence; and
- (2) \$100,000 rather than \$500,000 for a crime of violence and the defendant used (rather than possessed) a firearm during the commission of the crime.

Representative Marino offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendment. Without objection, the amendment was adopted by a vote of 7 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Edmonston, Garofalo, Horton, Knox, LaFleur, Marcelle, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

Representative Bacala offered amendments to:

- (1) Remove proposed law that the defendant proves by clear and convincing evidence that the mandatory minimum bail amount violates factors in present law; and
- (2) Require the court to set an initial bail in certain amounts, unless there is evidence that the mandatory minimum bail amount violates factors in present law.

Representative Bacala offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments, to which Representative LaFleur objected. The administrative assistant called the roll, and the amendments were adopted by a vote of 8 yeas, 4 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Horton, Muscarello, Seabaugh, and Villio voted yea. Representatives Bryant, Knox, LaFleur, and Marcelle voted nay. Representative Marino abstained.

Representative Bacala offered a motion to report House Bill No. 498 with amendments, to which Representative LaFleur objected. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Horton, Muscarello, and Seabaugh voted yea. Representatives Marino, Bryant, Knox, and LaFleur voted nay.

#### Senate Bill No. 49 by Senator Hewitt

Senator Hewitt presented Senate Bill No. 49, which increases penalties for the crime of creation or operation of a clandestine laboratory for the unlawful manufacture of certain controlled dangerous substances.

Representative Horton offered a motion to report Senate Bill No. 49 favorably. Without objection, Senate Bill No. 49 was reported favorably by a vote of 9 yeas and 0 nays. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Horton, Knox, LaFleur, Marcelle, and Villio voted yea.

#### House Bill No. 446 by Representative Miguez

On behalf of the author, Representative Garofalo presented House Bill No. 446, which provides relative to online handgun education course curriculum.

Representative Garofalo offered a motion to report House Bill No. 446 favorably. Without objection, House Bill No. 446 was reported favorably by a vote of 8 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Horton, Knox, LaFleur, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

#### Senate Bill No. 14 by Senator Bernard

On behalf of the author, Representative Bacala presented Senate Bill No. 14, which provides relative to schedules of the Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Law.

Representative Bacala offered amendments to:

- (1) Delete twelve proposed Schedule I substances; and
- (2) Make technical changes.

Representative Bacala offered a motion to adopt the proposed amendments. Without objection, the amendments were adopted by a vote of 8 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Bryant, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Knox, LaFleur, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.

Representative Edmonston offered a motion to report Senate Bill No. 14 with amendments. Without objection, Senate Bill No. 14 was reported with amendments by a vote of 9 yeas, 0 nays, and 1 abstention. Representatives Bacala, Edmonston, Garofalo, Goudeau, Horton, Knox, LaFleur, Muscarello, and Villio voted yea. Representative Marino abstained.
