"§2331. Intervention

A. An aggrieved person has the right to intervene as a party in the hearing as authorized by R.S. 46:2325, provided a proper request for intervention is filed at least twenty days prior to the hearing and such intervention is not likely to create an undue broadening of the issues or otherwise unduly impede the resolution of the matter.

B. A petition for intervention shall state all facts necessary to demonstrate that the petitioner is an aggrieved person. It shall be served upon all parties by the intervenor when filed with the administrative hearings clerk.

C. If more than one person or entity with the same or similar interests seeks to intervene, the administrative law judge may require them to designate a representative to participate on their behalf.

D. Upon good cause shown and with permission of the administrative law judge, persons with timely and properly pending petitions for intervention may be considered parties for the limited purposes of discovery, exchanges of information, prehearing conferences, service of pleadings, and other such purposes as allowed by the presiding officer, provided no prejudice is shown to existing parties.

E. Unless otherwise ordered by the administrative law judge, opposition by parties to a petition for intervention must be filed with the administrative hearings clerk within ten days after service on the parties of the petition and shall be served on the petitioner and all parties.

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F.
