Management & Finance



The mission of the Office of Management and Finance is to specify, procure and allocate resources necessary to support the mission of the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF).

The Management & Finance Program Includes:

- <u>Fiscal Services</u> Coordinates, prepares, and administers the budget development, implementation, control, and management of the operating budget for LDAF.
- <u>Human Resources</u> Recruits and employs qualified candidates for positions, handles various employee matters, and provides employee training.
- <u>Information Technology</u> Provides the department's network infrastructure, security administration and development of applications to support department function.
- <u>Procurement</u> Assures all purchases of supplies, equipment, and services requested by the department are made in accordance with all policies, codes and laws.
- Fleet and Facility Responsible for the repairs and maintenance of 43 properties, 120 buildings, and 613 motor vehicles for the department.
- <u>Indian Creek Recreation Area-Alexandria</u> Used for the operation and maintenance of the Indian Creek Recreation Area and Reservoir Area in Woodworth, Louisiana, which is used for timber production, research, education, recreation, water control and environmental protection.

Agricultural & Environmental Sciences



The mission of the Office of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences is to ensure that animal feeds, pet foods, fertilizers, agricultural liming materials and pesticides meet all requirements of law; to monitor, prevent, control and eradicate plant pests and diseases that threaten Louisiana's agriculture, environment and economy; to protect human health and the environment by ensuring the proper labeling, distribution, storage, use, application and disposal of pesticides, and through enforcing of all pesticide laws.

The Agricultural & Environmental Sciences Program Includes:

- Horticulture & Quarantine Program Monitors and provides for the prevention, control, and eradication of regulated and exotic crop pests or diseases, as well as oversees the qualifications and practices of persons engaged in the green industry.
- <u>Pesticide & Environmental Program</u> Inspects, enforces, and regulates the registration, distribution, sale, offering for sale, and application of pesticides.
- <u>Agricultural Chemistry Programs</u> Administers state laws and regulations which regulate the manufacturing and sale of animal feeds, pet foods, fertilizers, and agricultural liming materials.
- <u>Seed Program</u> Ensures that seed sold for planting purposes meets seed label guarantees and quality standards.

Animal Health & Food Safety



The mission of the Office of Animal Health and Food Safety is to: guard and protect the integrity of the livestock industry against animal diseases through diagnostic, preventative eradication and other deterrent measures; to protect the food chain, public health, and general welfare of the Louisiana citizenry by assuring that meat, seafood, poultry, eggs, fruits and vegetables and their products are properly identified, labeled, inspected and accurately graded; and to control livestock theft by denying a market for stolen cattle and horses in Louisiana.

The Animal Health & Food Safety Program Includes:

- <u>Livestock Brand Commission</u> Investigates farm related crimes with the main focus on the identification of livestock through registered brands and markings.
- Food Quality Services (FQS) Program Provides unbiased third party inspections, state inspections, and shipping point inspections for fresh fruits and vegetables grown in Louisiana.
- <u>Poultry & Egg Division</u> Establishes grades for poultry and eggs sold in Louisina. It also enforces state laws, rules and regulations for egg and poultry production, packing, and sales.
- <u>Louisiana Egg Commission</u> Promotes eggs and egg products in Louisiana and issues licenses. In addition, the commission can hold hearings on violation of the state egg marketing laws and enforce penalties for found violations.
- <u>Veterinary Health Division</u> Protects Louisiana livestock from infectious diseases; ensures the safety of the meat and poultry that enter the food chain.
- <u>Meat & Poultry Inspection Program</u> Provides consumers with safe, wholesome, properly labeled meat and poultry products.
- <u>Food Distribution Program</u> Ensures the US Department of Agriculture (USDA)
 commodities are distributed to eligible recipient agencies. It is an integral part
 in the National School Lunch Program.

Agro-Consumer Services



The mission of the Office of Agro-Consumer Services is to ensure that equity prevails in the marketplace by regulating various aspects of commerce and trade and by promoting and heightening consumer awareness of Louisiana's agricultural commodities to increase sales, thereby enhancing the economic well being of Louisiana farmers and the state as a whole.

The Agro-Consumer Services Program Includes:

- <u>Grain Sampler/Grader Certification</u> Handles the certification and testing of samplers and graders.
- <u>Grain Commodity Program</u> Inspectors compare quality or condition of agricultural commodities with official standards to determine the official grade.
- Weights and Measures Inspects and tests all weighing, measuring, metering, scanning, and packaging devices used commercially.
- Metrology Laboratory Maintains the standards of mass, length, and volume, and calibrates and certifies those standards and instruments used in commerce, industry, education, and research institutions.
- <u>Dairy Testing and Programs</u> Work with other agencies to regulate and test dairy within the state. They also enforce the Milk Buyers Bonding Law, which ensures dairy farmers will be paid for the milk they produce.
- <u>Commodity Promotion and Research</u> Administers promotion and research development programs that serve farmers and consumers. It is responsible for the Senior Farmer's Market Nutrition Program and the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Farmer's Market Nutrition Program.

Forestry



The mission of the Office of Forestry is to protect, conserve and replenish the forest resources of the state.

The Forestry Program Includes:

- <u>Forestry Protection</u> Includes detection, suppression, and prevention
 of wildfires on the forest land of Louisiana. Included in these
 objectives are community education, training, and outreach.
- <u>Forestry Management</u> Provides landowner assistance to ensure proper forest management practices. These services include technical and practical assistance as well as administering landowner subsidy programs.

Soil & Water Conservation



The mission of the Office of Soil and Water Conservation (OSWC) is to conserve and sustain these resources on Louisiana's croplands, grasslands, woodlands, wetlands, urban areas and waterways.

The Soil & Water Conservation Program Includes:

- <u>Coastal Marsh Revegetation Planting Program</u> Plans and implements vegetative planting for erosion control and restoration on private and state owned coastal marshes.
- <u>Soil Survey Program</u> Ensures availability of current scientific soils data and interpretive information for the development and application of effective conservation and environmental and protective practices.
- <u>EPA Clean Water Act, Section 319</u> Implements site specific conservation and environmental protection plans within priority watersheds.
- Agricultural Solid Waste Program Reduces the costly disposal of agricultural
 waste at regulated solid waste sites, increases the beneficial use of most
 agricultural and forestry processing by-products for improving soil condition,
 fertility, and production and protects air and water quality.
- <u>Information/Education Outreach Program</u> Delivers quality standards-based conservation education materials and resources to classroom educators and students, communities, individuals and agricultural producers.
- <u>Federal Conservation Programs</u> Directed toward wetland restoration, soil erosion control, water quality protection, wildlife habitat creation/enhancement and native vegetation restoration.

BUDGET HISTORY (IN MILLIONS)



MAJOR SOURCES OF REVENUE

Federal Funding \$10.6 Million

Funds are primarily received from the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) to help administer services throughout Louisiana. Other sources of Federal Funding include the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to ensure environmental safety while administering pesticides and other substances to the crops of Louisiana.

Statutory Dedications \$34.1 Million

The four largest include:

- \$12 Million Louisiana Agriculture Authority Fund
- \$4 .6 Million Petroleum Products Fund
- \$4 Million Pesticide Fund
- \$2.6 Million -Horticulture & Quarantine Fund

Statutory dedications are listed in further detail on the following slide.

Self Generated Revenue \$7.0 Million

Derived from miscellaneous sources such as:

- Various fees and fines for violations of agricultural regulations
- Pesticide dealer licenses
- · Agriculture dealing
- Reimbursement from the Louisiana Agricultural Finance Authority (LAFA) for salaries of maintenance personnel
- Poultry, egg, fruit and vegetable inspections
- Market Bulletin subscriptions.

Interagency Transfers \$686,125

Funds received from various agencies for: the storage of the state's antiviral cache of medications which would be needed during an influenza pandemic to treat and protect citizens: restoration of fire prevention and suppression activities; and to develop erosion control along the coast of Louisiana and the critical area treatment for erosion control and vegetation management.

Program. The Revenue Estimating Conference forecasted collections of \$5.2 million for FY 18, and this increase allows the department to fully utilize the authority of the fund.

\$585,817 Statutory Dedications Increases in the Feed & Fertilizer Fund (\$309,541), Structural Pest Control Fund (\$177,583) and the Pesticide Fund (\$98,693) to fund six additional inspectors. The positions are being moved from vacant positions in Management & Finance.

\$575,000 Federal Funds • Increase in Acquisitions and Major Repairs for the purchase of IT equipment in the Management & Finance program, a refrigerated truck, and a USAmeals software package for the federal Food Distribution Program.

\$422,368

 Transfers a federal grant from the Food and Drug Administration related to the Feed Program from Agriculture and Environmental Science to Animal Health and Food Safety.

SIGNIFICANT ADJUSTMENTS



\$140,991 State General Fund

- Additional funding for a federal grant received in FY17 for the implementation
 of the Food and Drug Administration's Produce Safety Rule. that establishes
 science-based minimum standards for the safe growing, harvesting, packing,
 and holding of fruits and vegetables grown for human consumption.
- The governor proposes a State General Fund reduction of \$505,453 (2.03%) to balance the FY18 state budget. Of this, \$231,990 was reduced from Management & Finance, \$205,338 was reduced from Forestry, \$62,670 was reduced from Animal Health and Food Safety, and \$6,455 was reduced from Soil & Water Conservation.
- The reduction was offset with an increase in State General Fund of \$229,080 to replace high mileage vehicles. There is also an additional net increase of \$135,382 for statewide adjustments for things such as retirement, related benefits, risk management, and acquisitions.

Acquisitions/Major Repairs \$448,602



EXPENDITURE HISTORY



Significant Adjustments
