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DEPARTMENT ORGANIZATION

Article IV, Section 8 of the Constitution of Louisiana

There shall be a Department of Justice, headed by the attorney general, who shall be the chief legal officer of the state...

As necessary for the assertion or protection of any right or interest of the state, the attorney general shall have authority (1) to institute, prosecute, or intervene in any civil action or proceeding; (2) upon the written request of a district attorney, to advise and assist in the prosecution of any criminal case; and (3) for cause, when authorized by the court which would have original jurisdiction and subject to judicial review, (a) to institute, prosecute, or intervene in any criminal action or proceeding, or (b) to supersede any attorney representing the state in any civil or criminal action.

Article X, Section 2

The unclassified civil service shall include employees, deputies, and officers of the office of the attorney general.

DEPARTMENT FUNCTIONS

Administrative \$6.1 Million

Contains the Executive Office and Administrative Services. Includes the collections section, which collects defaulted student loans and assists 11 boards, agencies, and commissions on collections.

Civil Law \$28.2 Million

Contains the Civil Division and the Public Protection Division. Includes attorneys assigned to various state departments, defense of state agencies in civil claims, writing legal opinions, and enforcement of the Tobacco Master Settlement agreement.

Criminal Law and Medicaid Fraud \$17.3 Million

Conducts or assists in criminal prosecutions; provides legal services; operates White Collar Crimes Section, Violent Crime and Drug Unit, Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, High Tech Crimes Unit, the Investigations Section, and the Sexual Predator Apprehension Team.

Risk Litigation \$18 Million

Provides legal representation for the state in civil rights, general liability, medical malpractice, road hazards, workers' compensation, and representation of the judicial branch. Funding comes from Interagency Transfers from the Office of Risk Management.

Gaming \$6.3 Million

Provides representation to the La. Gaming Control Board, the La. Lottery Corporation, the State Racing Commission, state police and the Dept. of Revenue. Funding is from statutory dedications, interagency transfers, and fees.

MAJOR SOURCES OF REVENUE

Self Generated Revenue

- \$6.6 million is in the Civil Law Program from consumer/antitrust settlements, Unfair Trade Practices Act penalties, and fees charged for legal services for quasi-state agencies.
- \$112K is from participation in the US Dept. of Justice Federal Forfeiture Program.
- \$112K is from the LA Lottery Commission.

Statutory Dedications

- \$1.6 Million is from the Dept. of Justice Legal Support Fund and \$2.5 million is from the Debt Collection Fund, which receive a portion of proceeds from lawsuits and collections.
- \$5.9 million is from funds received from gaming and is used for the Gaming Program.
- \$1.8 Million is from funds related to enforcement of the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement.
- \$1.4 Million is from a fund for Medicaid Fraud detection.

Interagency Transfers

- \$18.1 Million is from the Office of Risk Management for the Risk Litigation Program.
- \$10.2 Million is for the Civil Law Program from various state agencies for legal services and from the LA Commission on Law Enforcement for safe schools and domestic violence training.
- \$1.2 Million is for the Criminal Law and Medicaid Fraud and Gaming Programs from various state agencies for investigative and legal services.

Federal Funding

- \$7.8 Million is from the US Medicaid Fraud Unit and the US Dept. of Justice.
- \$683K is from the US Dept. of Housing and Urban Development for administration of the Louisiana open housing law.

SIGNIFICANT ADJUSTMENTS



Increase in State General Fund to replace a decrease in the Revenue Estimating Conference's forecasted amount for the Statutory Dedication Department of Justice Legal Support Fund.

Increase for statewide adjustments including \$2.8 Million for personnel services adjustments.



The governor recommended a \$334,000 State General Fund reduction to balance the FY18 budget.



Reduction in Interagency Transfers for \$1.1 Million of expenditure authority carried forward from the prior year.

SIGNIFICANT ADJUSTMENTS

Reduction out of the Louisiana Fund based on historical actual expenditures.

Increase in the Criminal Law and Medicaid Fraud Program from the Medical Assistance Programs Fraud Detection Fund and 75% Federal Match.



18 positions in the Civil Law Program and 1 position in the Criminal Law and Medicaid Fraud Program eliminated from unfunded vacant positions.

SIGNIFICANT EXPENDITURE CHANGES

Salaries \$1 Million Increase

• 4% increase overall from Existing Operating Budget while 19 vacant positions are eliminated.

Related Benefits \$1.7 Million Increase

• Represents a 14% increase from Existing Operating Budget. Related Benefits increase as a percentage of salary expenditures from 49% to 53%.


Professional Services (\$2.4 Million) Decrease

• Major changes were \$1.1 Million from expenditures funded out of the Louisiana Fund which was also reduced as part of Deficit No. 2. \$1.1 Million was carried forward from the prior fiscal year to the current year.

Acquisition/Major Repairs (\$1 Million) Decrease

• Includes \$675K carried forward from the prior fiscal year.





PERFORMANCE INFORMATION

Over the last five years the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit has:

- Received more than 7,500 complaints of abuse and fraud, resulting in approximately 300 new cases per year, resulting in approximately 100 arrests and 90 convictions per year, or 1.7 convictions per staff member per year.
- Averaged recoveries of \$125 Million per year, or \$2.35 Million in recoveries per staff member per year.
