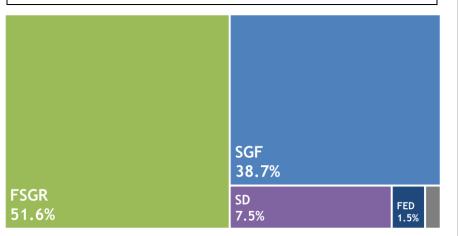

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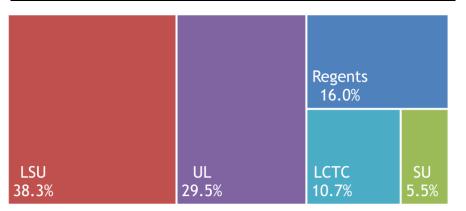

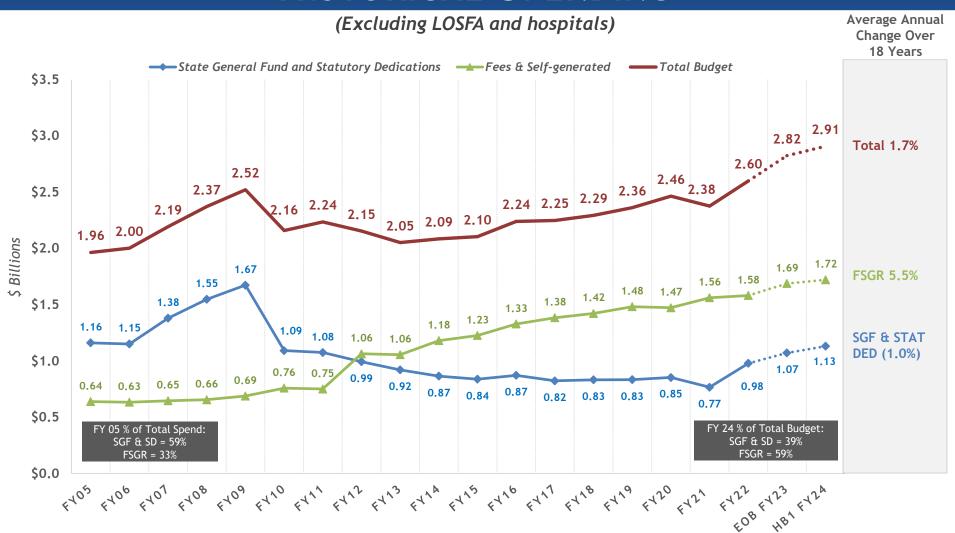

### Significant funding changes compared to the FY 23 Existing Operating Budget

### State General Fund

\$29.2 M net addition from an increase of \$126.5 M in new funding coupled with the removal of (\$12.6 M) in line-item appropriations from the current FY 23 budget and removal of (\$84.7 M) in TOPS to adjust for student participation (\$22.9 M) and to replace with statutory dedications (\$61.8 M)

### Fees & Self-generated

\$32.7 M net increase to align collections with budget authority due to changes in enrollment

### **Statutory Dedications**

\$26.5 M increase primarily from:

- \$61.8 M increase to replace SGF due an increase in the TOPS Fund
- (\$35.3 M) net decrease in various dedicated funds to remove one-time investments and make adjustments to align with the updated REC forecast

### Federal Funds

- (\$15.1 M) decrease associated with the Federal Family Education Loan Program
- (\$8.3 M) to remove budget authority from not receiving a Good Jobs Challenge grant
- (\$5.0 M) decrease related to the GEAR UP grant

# System Funding Comparison FY 24

### State General Fund

Since the FY 2010 budget development process and pursuant to higher education preamble language, for purposes of developing the higher education budget DOA transfers all General Fund from the management boards and institutions to BOR in the General Appropriations Bill (HB1). However, the "FY 24 Formula" column is the preliminary formula approved by the Board of Regents at the March 22, 2023 meeting spread to the systems. The allocation is subject to change based on final Board approval.

# HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING FORMULA

• The Board of Regents is responsible for formulation of a master plan that "shall include a formula for equitable distribution of funds to the institutions of postsecondary education"

[Const. Article VIII, Sec. 5(D)(4) and R.S. 17:3128(A)(1)]

- In addition, the Board is responsible for reporting any funding formula adopted for postsecondary institutions no later than March thirty-first of each year (R.S. 17:3129(F)). The current outcomes-based funding formula (R.S.17:3129.2) "ensures the equitable allocation of state funds to public postsecondary educational institutions, appropriately considers costs, places significant emphasis on student and institutional outcomes, and aligns with the state's economic development and workforce needs."
- The current 2- and 4-year institutions funding formula consist of 3 components:
  - Base Level Funding prior year allocation
  - <u>Cost</u> weighted differentiation based on varying Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) peer-group salary data, course offerings, degree level of students, class size, and support services
  - Outcomes metrics based on completer levels, transfers, completers in high-demand fields (four and five-star jobs), time-to-award, research, completion of Pell Grant, underrepresented minorities, and adult students

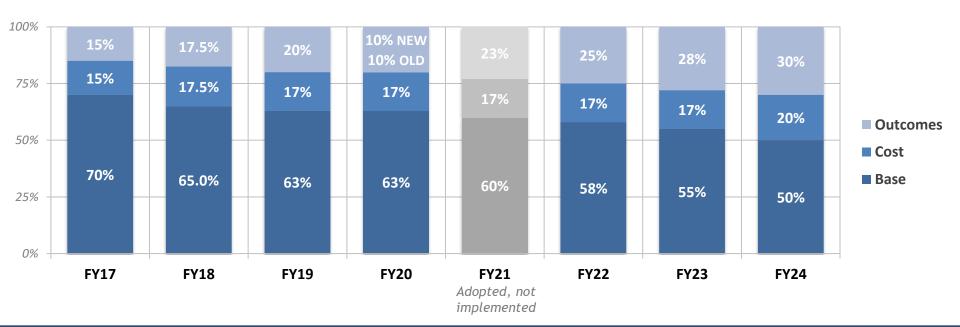
All general fund currently resides under the Board of Regents in HB1. The FY 24 funding formula was approved at the March 22, 2023 board meeting and aims to execute a 50% Base, 20% Cost, and 30% Outcomes distribution. Management boards retain the authority to reallocate up to 5% of the SGF.

# HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING FORMULA

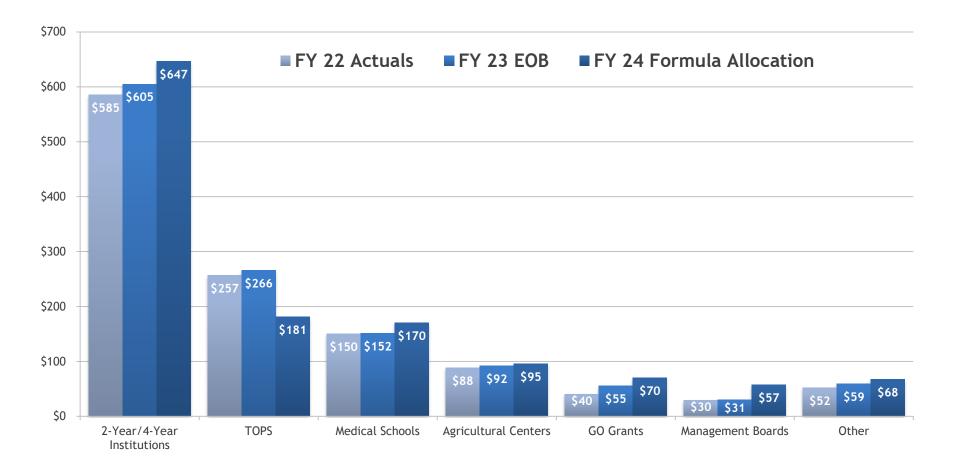
Since FY 2017, an outcomes-based funding formula model has been adopted for 2-and 4year institutions and a pro-rata distribution for the specialized institutions

The graph below illustrates the shifts in the Board's policy decisions over the last eight years when weighing various portions of the outcomes-based funding formula, including the originally adopted formula for FY 21.

(In FY 21, the State General Fund appropriation to higher education as a whole was reduced compared to FY 20 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and utilizing CARES Act federal funds. Because of this, the funding formula was not implemented.)

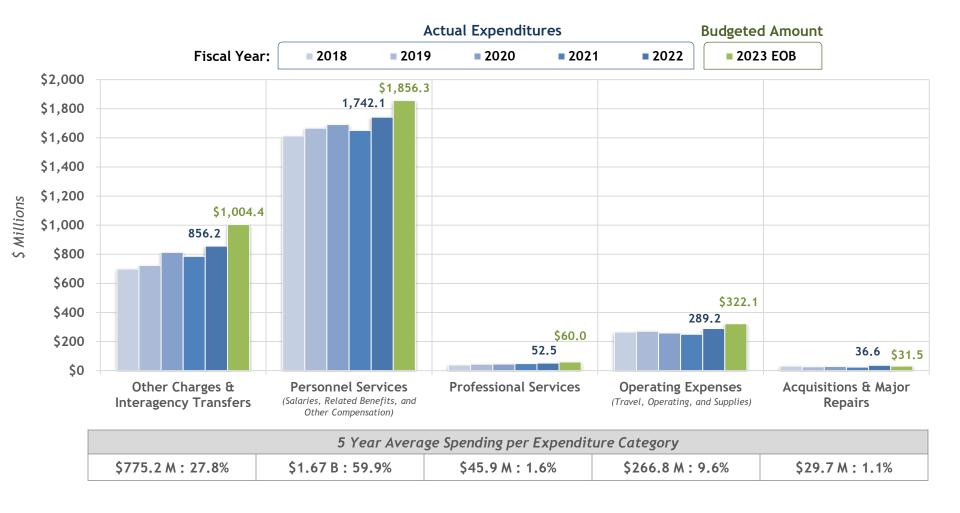

The commissioner of administration presented the executive budget to JLCB on February 17, 2023; the presentation included proposals for a number of potential items for supplemental bill consideration using the current year excess SGF; this included a transfer of \$100 M into the Higher Education Initiatives Fund for various programs, such as allied health and nursing programs, cybersecurity, high demand worker training for 2-4 year institutions, and campus security statewide.

# SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

- (\$84.7 M) SGF reduction in the TOPS program consists of two separate adjustments:
  - (\$22.9 M) decrease as a result of lower student participation, approximately 2,000 fewer students projected to participate when compared to the FY 22 actuals

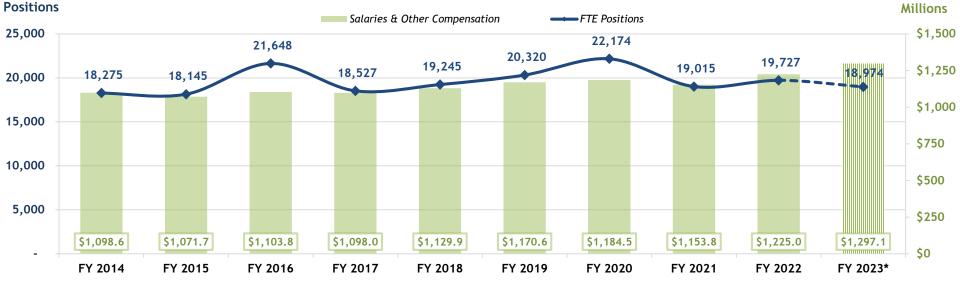

Through statewide academic planning and review, budgeting and performance funding, research, and accountability, Regents coordinates the efforts of the state's 32 degree granting public institutions in addition to Louisiana State University and Southern University Agricultural Centers and Pennington Biomedical Research Center.



The Board of Regents (BOR) also serves as the state liaison to Louisiana's accredited, independent institutions of higher learning. The Board of Regents is not involved in overseeing the day-to-day operations of college campuses, but is responsible for setting important statewide policies and standards including minimum admissions requirements, as well as benchmarks and targets.

Included within the Board of Regents are the following major sections:

Office of the Commissioner; Finance and Administration; Academic Affairs and Innovation; Strategic Planning and Student Success; Research and Sponsored Initiatives; and Public Affairs.

# BOARD OF REGENTS

### Louisiana Office of Student Financial Assistance

LOSFA's mission is to facilitate the progression towards college access and success by educating students and families about careers and the related college options, applying to attend college, showing up on campus, and persisting beyond the first year.

LOSFA administers the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS) scholarship program, the college savings plan called Student Tuition Assistance and Revenue Trust (START) Saving Plan, the ABLE (Achieving a Better Life Experience) Program, the Louisiana Go Grant, M.J. Foster Promise Program, and other assistance programs.

LOSFA provides college access assistance to high school students across Louisiana through seminars, workshops, and special events designed to motivate, instruct, and follow through. The office has also increased outreach and advising efforts to non-traditional students and returning adults to inform them of new initiatives such as the Completers program and M.J. Foster Promise.

### **TOPS PROGRAM**

A program of state scholarships for Louisiana residents who attend either one of the Louisiana public colleges and universities, schools that are a part of the Louisiana Community and Technical College System, Louisiana approved proprietary and cosmetology schools, or institutions that are a part of the Louisiana Association of Independent Colleges and Universities.

### START SAVING PROGRAM

The program is a college savings plan designed to help families contend with the growing costs of educating their children after high school.

### START K12 PROGRAM

The program is a savings plan that allows families to save for tuition expenses related to attendance at any Louisiana K12 school.



### **GO GRANT PROGRAM**

The program provides a need-based component to the state's financial aid plan to support nontraditional and low-to-moderate income students.

### ABLE PROGRAM

The program is a savings plan supporting persons with disabilities in endeavors to maintain health, independence, and quality of life.

### BOARD OF REGENTS

### Louisiana Universities Marine Consortium

LUMCON's mission is to promote, facilitate, and conduct research and education collaborations among Louisiana's universities in marine and coastal sciences relevant to the sustainability of coastal and marine environments of the Gulf of Mexico by:

- Conducting research and education programs directly relevant to Louisiana's needs in marine and coastal science.
- Serving as a facility for all Louisiana schools with interests in marine research and education in order to make all levels of society increasingly aware of the economic and cultural value of Louisiana's coastal and marine environments.
- Sponsoring and coordinating educational events, conducting educational programs, and developing educational products in the marine/coastal sciences for universities, K-12 schools and the public that makes use of LUMCON's location and facilities.



### **LUMCON Research Vessel**

The 116 foot "Pelican" was built in 1985 at Allied Shipyard in Larose, Louisiana with capital outlay funds provided by the State of Louisiana. In 2003, the research vessel underwent a refit upgrading a majority of the scientific equipment onboard and adding an additional 10 feet to the stern.



# LOUISIANA STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

The institutions of the Louisiana State University System range from a major research university, to master's and doctoral granting four-year institutions, to a two-year community college, as well as two highly specialized research institutions: the LSU Agricultural Center and the Pennington Biomedical Research Center. In addition, LSU provides a comprehensive group of professional schools ranging from law, veterinary medicine, medicine, dentistry, and the full spectrum of allied health professions. Through its Health Care Service Division, LSU also operates one public hospital.

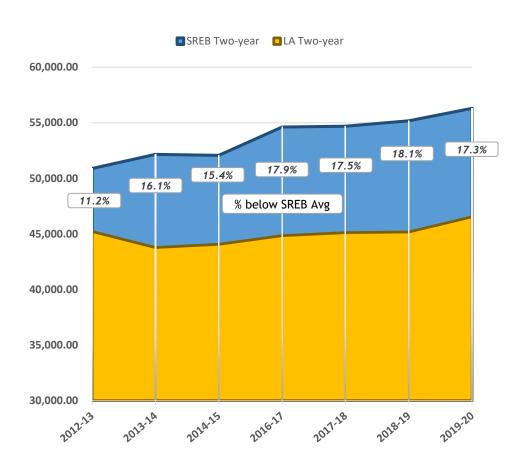

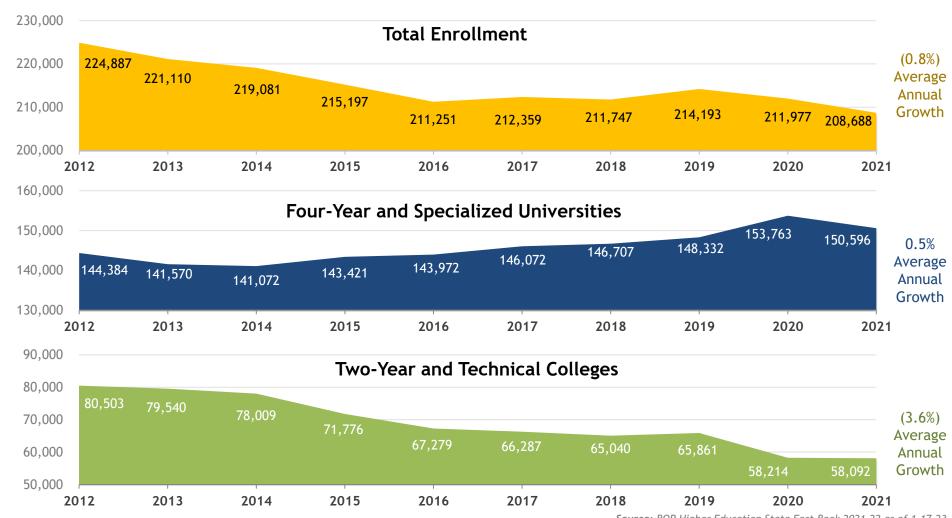

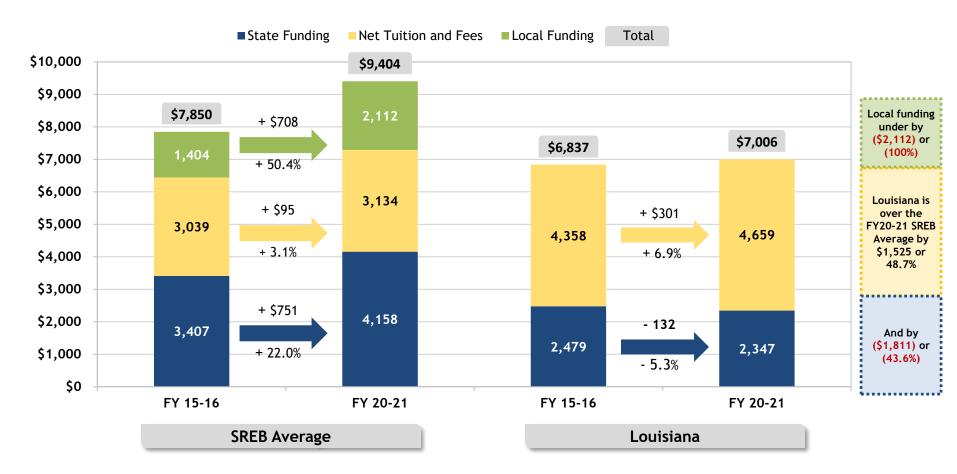

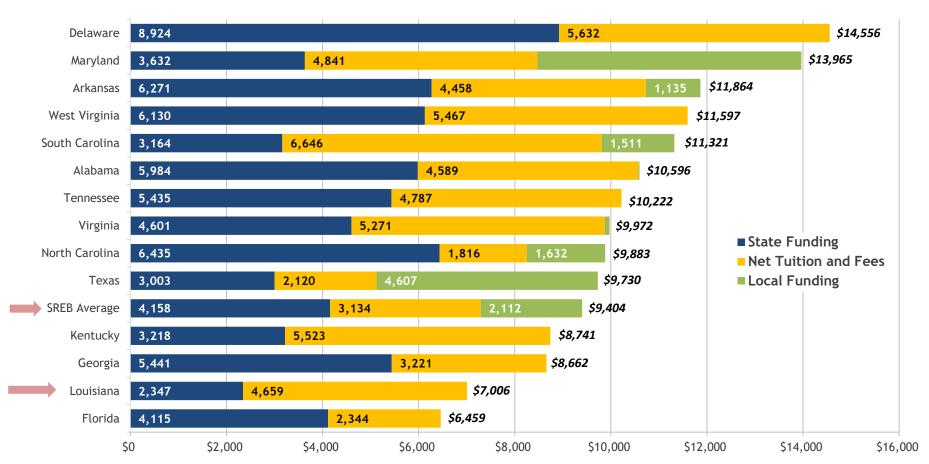

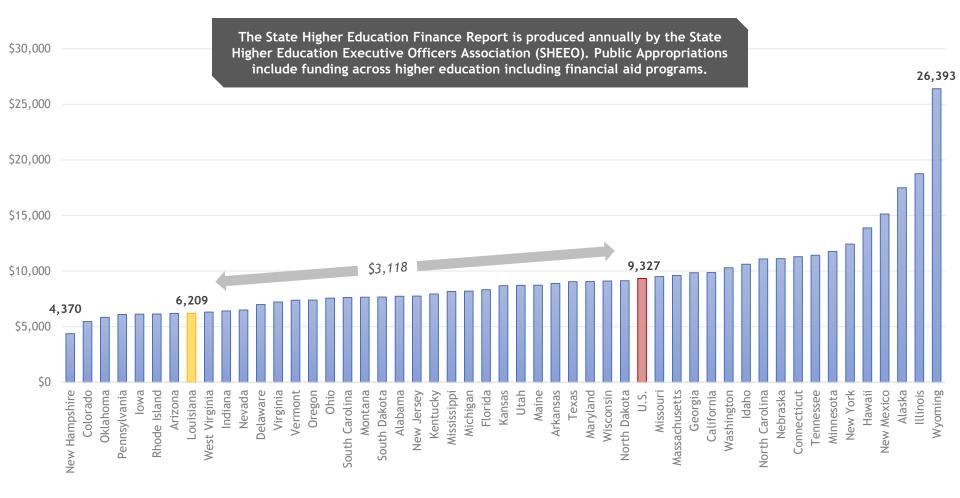

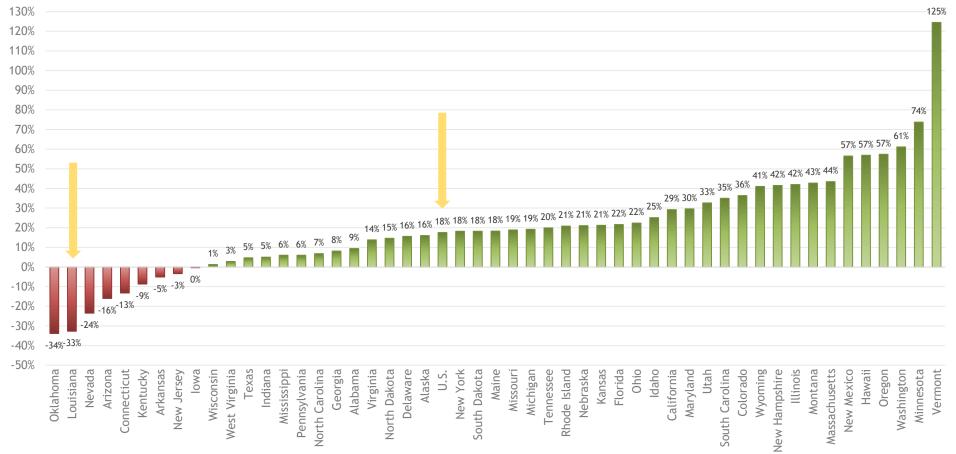
### Public HIED Appropriations per FTE Student

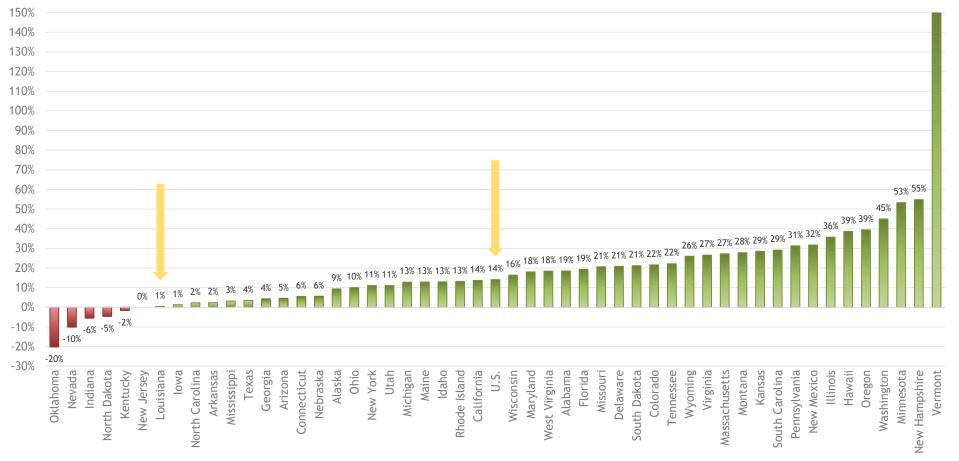

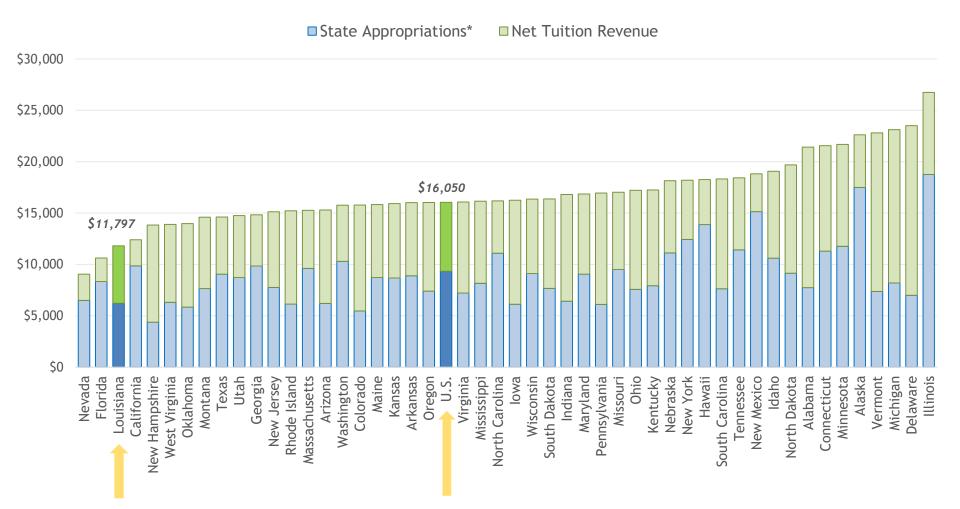
### Public HIED Appropriations per FTE Student

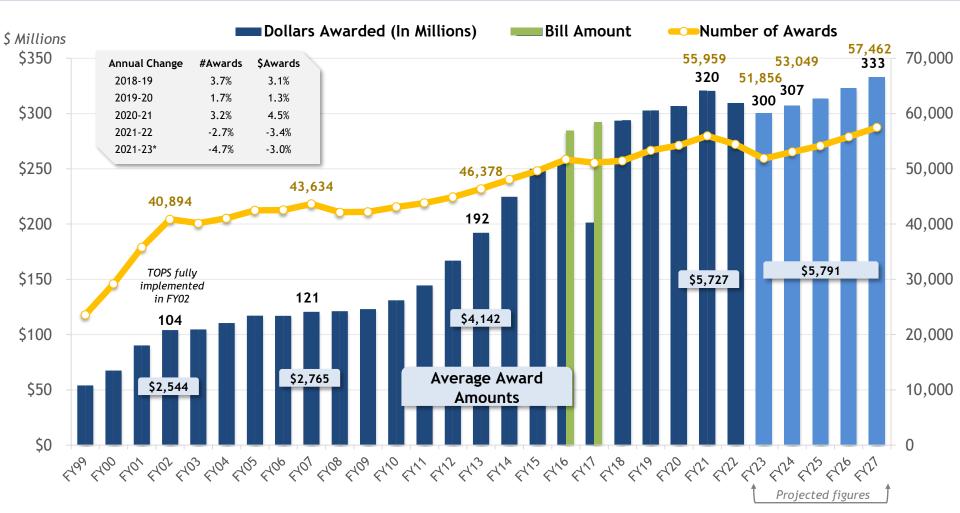
### HIED FUNDING PER FTE STUDENT

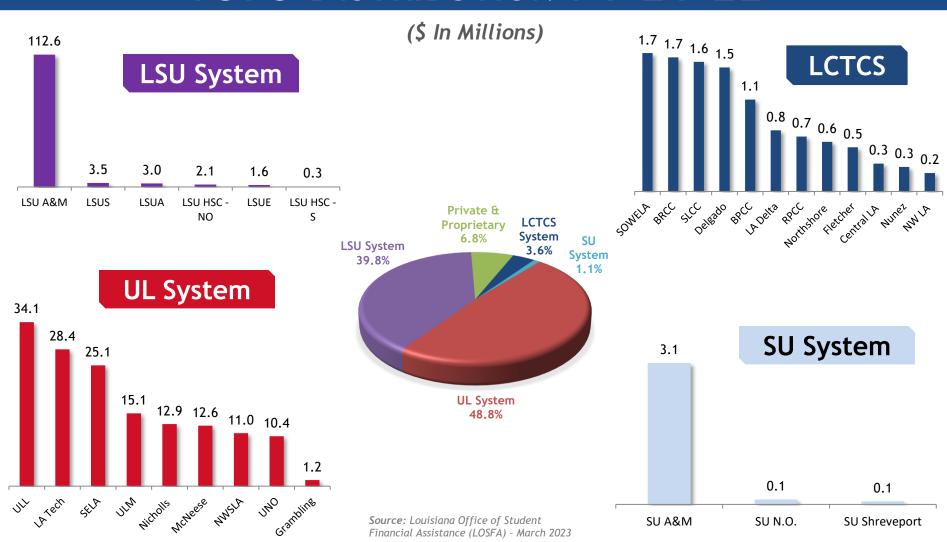
# TAYLOR OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS



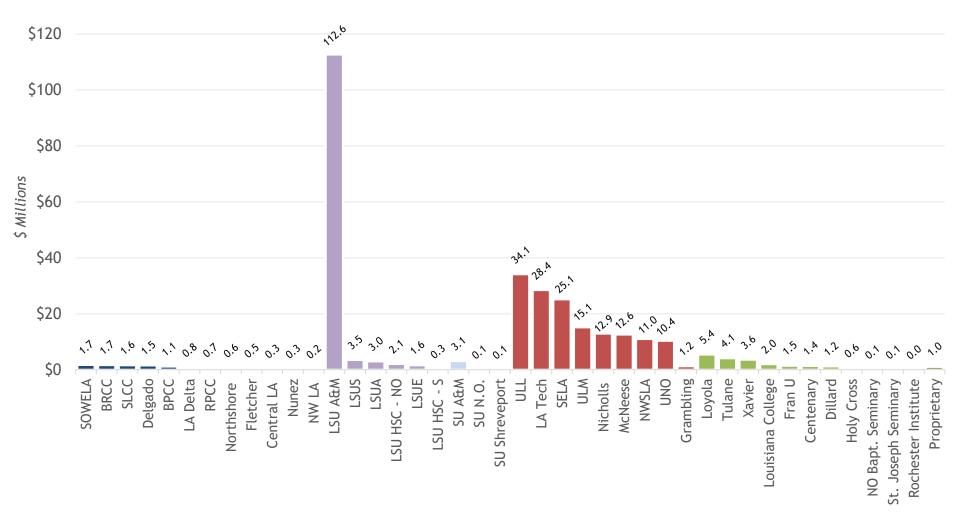

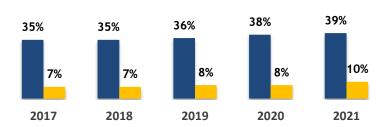




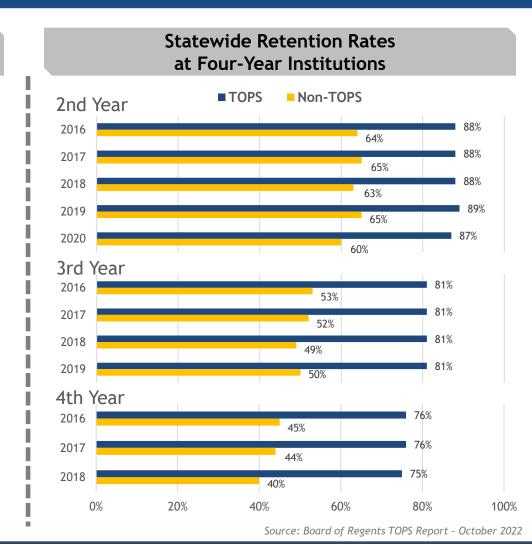
#### Six-Year (150%) Rate

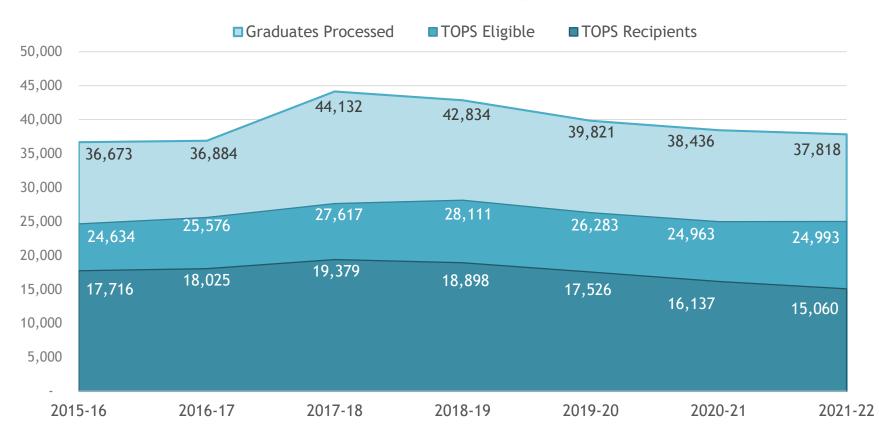

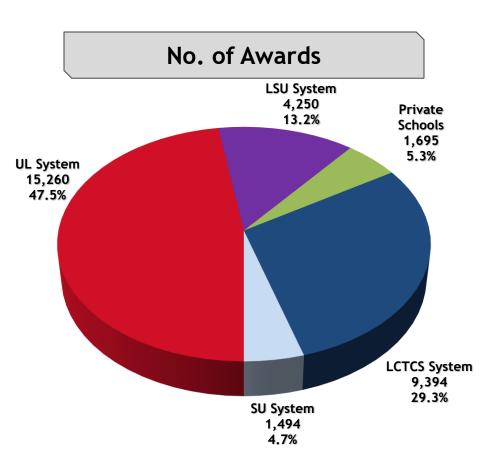

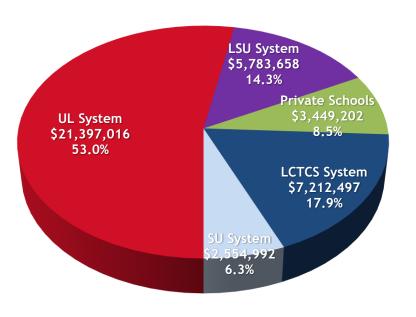
