Born on November 14, 1934 - Mr. Ellis Louis Marsalis Jr. a born and raised native of New Orleans, Louisiana and would go on to become one of the world's greatest and notable jazz pianists, musicians, teachers and mentors of all time.

Mr. Marsalis earned a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education from Dillard University, New Orleans in 1955 and taught at Xavier University Preparatory School. Mr. Marsalis also earned a Master's Degree in Music Education from Loyola University in New Orleans and led the jazz studies program at the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts for high school students.

During his timeless and spanning musical career Mr. Marsalis gained national acclaim for his devotion to traditional jazz. As a New Orleans native Mr. Marsalis was very instrumental in giving back to his community and mentoring underserved children, youth and musicians. Mr. Marsalis founded the Ellis Marsalis Center (the "Center") located in the 9th ward to create a safe and positive atmosphere for underserved children and youth to develop their musical, academic and social talents. The center also delivers strategic assistance and tools to Village musicians that can enhance their professional growth and opportunities for musicians throughout the city of New Orleans. Through the "Center" the musical vision of Ellis Marsalis will continue to live on for decades to come.
